What is EYM 2011?

International Organisational Committee (representatives from 10 countries- UK, France, Holland, Italy, Belgium, Estonia, Latvia, Moldova, Turkey and Russia), led by Sillamäe Society for Child Welfare is conducting from 19.07 – 24.07, in Tallinn, **European Youth Meeting for Sustainable Development 2011 (EYM2011)**. The Meeting promotes fair and green economy and is aimed toward increasing the involvement of young people in sustainable development. The Meeting will produce a general political statement provisionally called "European Youth for Sustainable Development" and specific local level initiatives to be carried out in the framework.

During the European Youth Meeting on Sustainable development in 2011, we want to mobilise youth voices and insights on the fair and green economy from a European perspective. The main work of the programme will be conducted in working groups, where the participants will stay for the duration of the Meeting. The groups are divided according to 7 sub-themes of Fair and Green Economy, namely natural resources, education for sustainable development, urban development, waste management, agriculture, social wellbeing and renewable energy. Combined, these themes will form the European youth view on the fair and green economy that will be finalised as the policy statement provisionally called "European Youth for Sustainable Development".

The Meeting will bring together a variety of expertise and influences in the fields of sustainable development, green economy and youth work, from across Europe and representatives from many other countries in the world – such as Cameroon, India, Philippines, Costa-Rica and many others.





WHY SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT and WHY NOW?

The world is facing a mounting crisis. In recent years we have experienced a combination of a global financial crisis, a food crisis, accelerating ecosystem degradation, an increasing number of climate-induced extreme weather events and crises of social structures. These multiple and inter-related crises call into question the ability of a growing human population to live peacefully and sustainably on this planet, and demand the urgent attention governments and citizens around the world. During the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (also known as Rio+20) in 2012 heads of states and governments will gather to address these issues.

The main focus of European Youth Meeting for Sustainable Development 2011 can be summed up as Fair and Green Economy. The Meeting serves as preparation for the Rio+20 UN Conference on Sustainable Development to be held in Rio de Janeiro in 2012 and the Green Economy in the context of Poverty Eradication and Sustainable Development, simply put 'a *fair and green economy*' is one of the key themes to be addressed by the UN Conference.

Sustainable development cannot be achieved by governments alone, it requires broad public participation and local actions. Therefore participation and input of civil society, especially children and youth as major stakeholders in the process, are of great importance. Currently, almost half the world's population is under 25 – that's three billion young people, making young people and youth organisations increasingly more important players in the international decision-making process. Young people have the best understanding of the challenges, strengths and opportunities that affect them. Youth-led organisations are in a unique position to develop and implement initiatives that address issues from a youth perspective and offer solutions that respond to the diverse realities of young people. Society needs young people who are informed, critical and involved in their communities - to effectively address local issues, but also global challenges like the one of ensuring sustainable development.

The Rio+20 UN Conference and the process leading up to it not only provide a unique opportunity to re-engage the world in sustainable development and bring renewed attention to the many crucial issues currently facing our world, but to instate young people, whose future is at stake, at the heart of the sustainable development agenda.

Rio+20 Process

In June 1992, the first UN Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED) was held in Rio de Janeiro and adopted an agenda for environment and development in the 21st Century. Agenda 21: A Programme of Action for Sustainable Development contains the Rio Declaration on Environment and Development, which recognizes each nation's right to pursue social and economic progress and assigned to States the responsibility of adopting a model of sustainable development; and, the Statement of Forest Principles. UNCED for the first time mobilized the Major Groups and legitimized their participation in the sustainable development process. This participation has remained a constant until today. For the first time also, the lifestyle of the current civilization was addressed in Principle 8 of the Rio Declaration. The urgency of a deep change in consumption and production patterns was expressly and broadly acknowledged by State leaders. Agenda 21 further reaffirmed that sustainable development was delimited by the integration of the economic, social and environmental pillars.

The spirit of the conference was captured by the expression "Harmony with Nature", brought into the fore with the first principle of the Rio Declaration: "Human beings are at the centre of concerns for sustainable development. They are entitled to a healthy and productive life in harmony with nature".

The United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (UNCSD)

The United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development (UNCSD) will take place in Brazil on 4-6 June 2012 to mark the 20th anniversary of the 1992 United Nations Conference on Environment and Development (UNCED), in Rio de Janeiro, and the 10th anniversary of the 2002 World Summit on



Sustainable Development (WSSD) in Johannesburg. It is envisaged as a Conference at the highest possible level, including Heads of State and Government or other representatives. The Conference will result in a focused political document.

The objective of the Conference is to secure renewed political commitment for sustainable development, assess the progress to date and the remaining gaps in the implementation of the outcomes of the major summits on sustainable development, and address new and emerging challenges.

The Conference will focus on two themes:

- 1. a green economy in the context of sustainable development and poverty eradication;
- 2. the institutional framework for sustainable development

Visiting the Parliament of Estonia on the 22nd of July

Before the conclusions of the full work process, visiting the Estonia's Parliament building has been planned. Just a few hundred yards from the Meeting venue, the Toompea Castle consists of buildings mostly dating from three periods: the medieval order's stronghold with its impressive western wall and towers, the most well-known of which is the tower of Tall



Hermann; the Russian-era government administration building with a facade representing classical styles and opening onto Castle Square; and the building of the Riigikogu, which originates from the time of the First Republic of Estonia and is hidden behind the walls of the castle.

The Final Presentation of the Statement in the historic House of the Brotherhood of Black Heads



The outcomes of the group work will be gathered together in one policy statement that will be the eventual outcome of the Meeting. The official presentation of the document will take place in the House of the Brotherhood of the Black Heads that is the only surviving Renaissance building in Tallinn. The official reception is organised by Tallinn City Government and will include invited guests and media representation.

The purpose of the Brotherhood of Blackheads was to unite young unmarried German merchants

before they could get acceptance to the Great Guild. They had chosen St. Maurice, a black officer of the Roman Thebean legion, for their patron. His head is depicted on the coat of arms of the brotherhood. The official reception is organised by Tallinn City Government and will include invited guests and media representation.

The Final Party at the venue's luxurious SPA Centre on the $23^{\rm rd}$ of July 2011.

From 22:00 until 02:00 a fun-filled programme has been comprised with music, different activities and contests, snacks and drinks to give the participants a chance to relax and enjoy themselves as well as celebrate the works done in the week before. The theme of the Party will be Welcome to Hawaii!



Working groups

The main work of the programme will be conducted in working groups, where the participants will stay for the duration of the Meeting. You will be set to your working group according to your preference as indicated upon arrival.

The groups are divided according to the Meetings official sub-themes:

Natural resources (including water, forests and fisheries)

The earth's population is expected to grow to 9 billion people in 2050. Next to the fact that every human needs resources to simply stay alive - like fresh water, food, clothes, shelter - we nowadays use a lot of natural resources planet earth offers us. The big question for this working group is: In which ways we can make sure that there are enough natural resources for future generations?

Education for sustainable development

Education forms a basis for the rest of your life. Things you learn in school and in other learning environments, such as your sport club or the scouting define your behaviour now, and in the future, in your country, and in other parts of the world. The big question for this working group is: How can the education system prepare us for the challenges of today and the future?

Urban development (including transport)

At this moment more than half of earth's population lives in cities. For example, in the city of Tallinn live 412.925 of the total Estonian population of 1.31 million, while in the past Estonians preferred to live in the countryside. Living with many people close to each other demands creative solutions. The big question for this working group is: In which way can urbanisation be turned into an opportunity towards a sustainable society.

Waste management (including recycling)

In our current European society, consumerism creates a lot of waste. Waste causes spatial, environmental and health problems. From the empty soda can on your street to the enormous amounts of plastic in oceans. However, waste can also be seen as a resource. The big question for this working group is: How can we minimize waste from society?

Agriculture

Hunger is a big problem in large parts of the world. On the other hand, large parts of the world have to deal with overconsumption. Not only our daily menu is supplied by agriculture, also, for example, the cotton for our jeans comes from agriculture. We are already using two-thirds of the earths land surface, which causes pressure on biodiversity within ecosystems. The big question is: How can we supply 9 billion people in 2050 with agricultural products within the carrying capacity of the earth?

Social wellbeing (including health)

Next to the environmental challenges we face as a society, there are a lot of social challenges. We still do not succeed to live in peace with each other, many people die early because of all kinds of diseases, oppression and inequalities are still in place, and many people in the world still have to survive with less than a dollar a day. The big question for this working group is: How can we improve the quality of life for all of us?

Renewable energy

Climate change, energy security and access to energy resources are in this field some emerging issues in the coming decades. The European economy imports 55% of their energy resources, and is mostly dependent on fossil fuels. There is an urgent need for a transition towards renewable energy resources. The big question for this working group is: How can we make a transition towards clean and secure energy supplies?

Skills workshops

During the programme, you will be given a choice of skills workshops that you will have to sign up for on the first day. Again, You will be asked to present a second option to ensure that all skills workshops are filled. Make sure you choose wisely as making changes later is very difficult.

Build your own campaign for Rio+20	Your experience at the EYM2011 will give you the knowledge and support network to mobilize fellow young people in your city/country/region to take action on sustainable development – but what happens afterwards? Join the workshop to work on and discuss questions such as "What is my message?", "Who is my target audience?", "What am I trying to achieve?" and start developing your campaign for Rio+20.
Future is due	Reflecting on global and local practice to reach effective sustainability. This workshop explores the concept of sustainability and allows for participants to reflect on their individual interpretation of the issue as well as collectively.
Basic methods for group leading	In this WS you will learn basic methods you need when you are working with groups. They will help you to structure a discussion, but also make sure that the results won 't get lost. In addition you will learn how to increase common understanding within a group.
Sustainable development and non formal education in developing countries (Case Study: Egypt)	The aim of the workshop is to explore the relation between sustainable development and non-formal Educational and cultural projects in Egypt. The workshop shall discuss the role that can be played by sustainable development to contribute enrichment of rural societies; utilizing the youth abilities and creativity.
Designing effective policies for Higher Education (HE) to engender sustainable development.	This workshop through a collaborative approach shall aim to examine and discuss the making of policy(s) (education policy) in order to make sense of how we can develop relevant education policies to engender sustainable development.
How to learn from oneself?	In this workshop we discover different ways of studying according to the development of our Psyche. We take time to stop and discuss why often times our abilities and skills stop to develop and how can we change that. Just like the ancient knowledge "know thyself", we will discover what are the symbolic secrets of our Psyche that help us to find our potential again. We will enter the world of collective unconscious and archetypes.
"Peace Journalism vs War Journalism : Different ways of news writing"	Peace Journalism is a new model of news writing and covering international crisis. How can this displace the War/ Violence Journalism, promote peace, pluralism and coexistence?
Project writing and management	A practical workshop on what goes into project writing and management. What you need to keep in mind when writing applications.
21st Century Green City Advertising : Tallinn	This is a practical workshop, where the participants will discover the green bits of central Tallinn and create an advertisement that could be promoted to take civic actions for making Tallinn more environmentally friendly. Needed: some kind of camera (either still or video).
Cultural barriers and embedded roots	Workshop is focused on intercultural barriers and stereotypes as well as a possible way to dialogue when different cultures are involved.
Initiating sustainable life patterns in the energy sector	Promoting sustainable bioenergy projects within the "Göttingen Approach of Sustainability Science".
"Estimation of degree risk" (in Russian)	The aim is to create and present the newest ways to estimate the risk level, ability to control crisis situations to save the stable development (the resources using model to satisfy the human needs; at the same way to save the environment so that these needs can be satisfied as well as today and in indefinite future.


